As proposed at the 2009 Theological Update Day

The Archdiocese of Seattle Catholic Schools department collaborated closely with the office of Parish Stewardship to develop curriculum suggestions based on 'The Twelve Gardens of Stewardship,' for presentation at the 2009 Theological Update Day. The resulting goal of this event was for our schools to include in their curriculums a grade and 'Garden' focus for each month of the school year.

The suggested focus for March is the Garden of the Soul in the curriculum for grade two.

Prayer Service for Staff Meetings

Garden of the Soul

Let us Pray:

Lord,

You are the sower and reaper, the planter and harvester. We are eager to cultivate the gifts in the fertile soil of hearts open to You.

Reading from Scripture:

“Finally, draw your strength from the Lord and from his mighty power.” *Eph 6: 10*

Meditation – How are we cultivating our gifts?

Do I regularly spend the time I want to with God in prayer? Do I take advantage of liturgies, retreats and other opportunities to grow in my spirituality? Do I use prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to cultivate my relationship with God? Do I allow myself quiet time to just listen to the ‘still, small voice’ of God?

Closing:

May the seeds that You have planted in our hearts, in all the gardens where we are called to be good stewards, produce a rich harvest for building up Your Kingdom.

Self Assessment for Staff Meetings

*Thoughts on each of the Twelve Gardens within the Four Pillars of Stewardship:
Prayer, Formation, Hospitality and Service*

Garden of the Soul

“With all prayer and supplication, pray at every opportunity in the Spirit.” Eph 6: 18

When you think of your Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, ask yourself how much time and effort you have committed to your relationship to Him, so that it can be healthy and continue to grow.

Prayer

Think of when you devoted time to a prayer/ liturgical retreat or workshop, etc. How did that help you grow in spirituality? Do you plan to participate in a similar activity this year and next, to continue to grow as a disciple of the Lord?

Formation

What formation opportunities are available to you? Think of prayer forms, retreats, and devotions that are offered in your parish or parish school. Is there a spirituality or prayer form you would like to learn about that isn't being offered? Consider ways to research this interest and/or involve the appropriate person regarding offering this specific formation opportunity.

Hospitality

What are your unique talents and gifts? Think of the spiritual gifts the Lord has given you. How can you use those gifts to make sure that no other disciple that 'knocks' on the door of your church is left feeling unwelcome? How can you help your church to evangelize and bring souls to the Lord?

Service

Do you feel challenged to pray for others? Think of a time that you participated in a prayer offered by your parish. What other opportunities are available for you to pray for others - as a Christian, as a Catholic, as a parishioner?

Online Curriculum Examples

Garden of Soul

Though philanthropy is the filter for many of these lesson plans, you will find a large number of appropriate choices and useful ideas. Here are instructions for reviewing a lesson plan that you may wish to draw from for your own use:

Path:

- Go to 'Learning to Give' www.learningtogive.org
- Click on top of page 'Find Lesson Plans'
- Select Keyword option
- Choose grade. If prompted to select a subject, you may wish to select 'All.' Select letter of a keyword to view lesson plans within that subject.
- To select the most appropriate lesson plan for your class, place the curser over the view icons and review a brief summary of each plan.

Garden of the Soul

Grade 2

Praying in faith is a strong tool for tending to the garden of our souls. It's easy for children to understand that prayer is a way to talk to God and that when we pray in Jesus' name, He is present with us. The student's preparation for the sacraments of Reconciliation and First Eucharist offer us an ideal opportunity to teach how both our individual prayers, as well as our group prayers, helps us to establish and nurture our personal relationship with God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

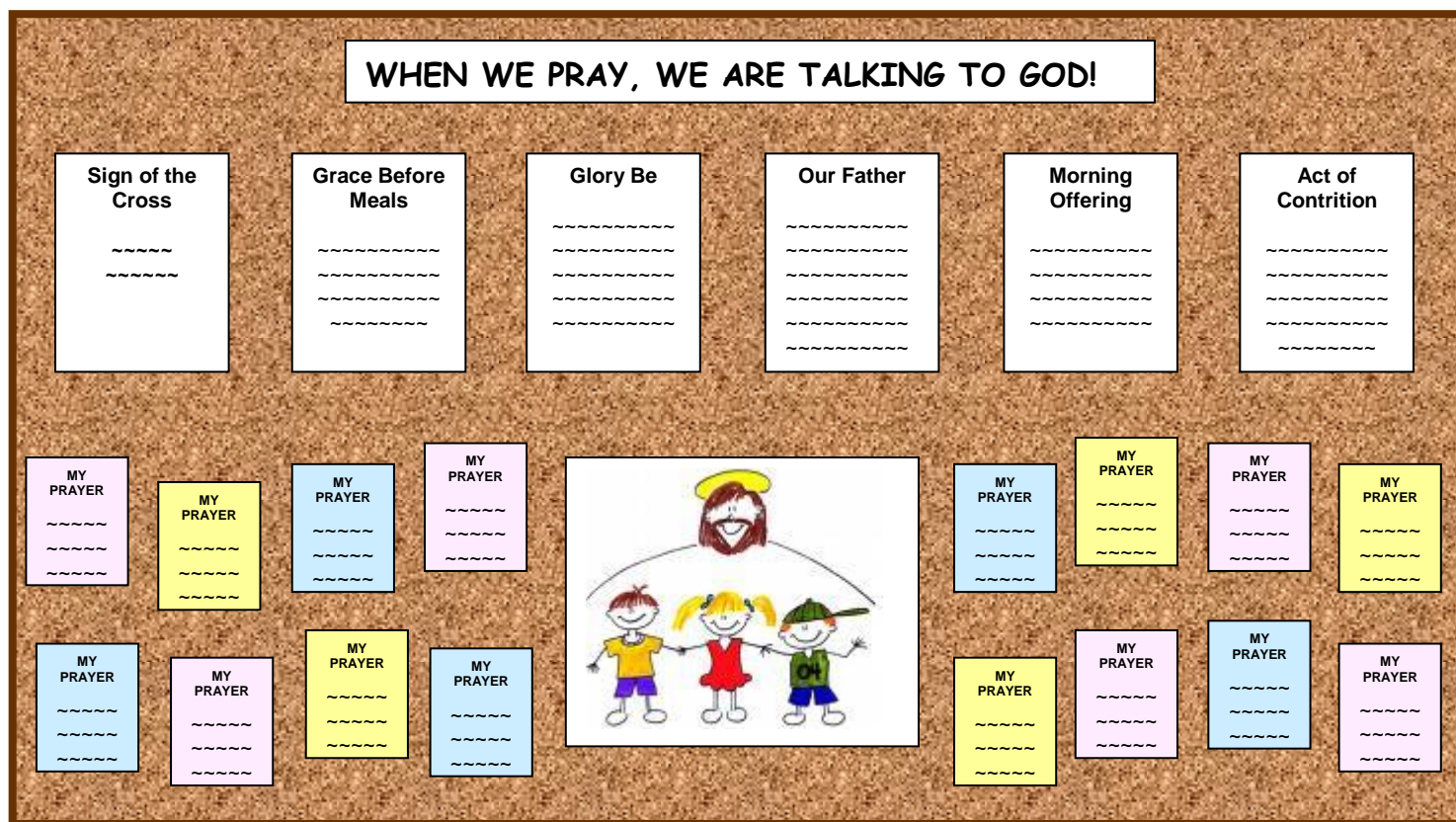
Project

- Title the bulletin board; When We Pray, We Are Talking to God!
- On large pieces of paper, print and display a selection of Catholic prayers appropriate for 2nd grade, according to Faith Formation guidelines. Some examples are shown below.
- On a large piece of poster paper, have students collaborate on a drawing of Jesus with children. (Alternative; teacher draw illustration or use purchased poster.)
- Give each student a paper titled 'My Prayer,' for them to write their personal message to God. Encourage illustrations and/or use colored paper.
- Post student's art and prayers on the board.

Being good stewards includes recognizing God's gifts in every area of our lives and using these gifts responsibly, in love and justice – to ourselves as well as toward others. The 'Twelve Gardens of Stewardship' is a concept which identifies twelve different areas of our everyday life in which we should be mindful of conducting ourselves within the will of God. During the school year, our students will focus one or more of these gardens. This month, our second grade students will focus on the Garden of the Soul.

Garden of the Soul

As people of faith, our ultimate desire is for our soul to attain the eternal life that God has promised to those who remain His sons and daughters. It is important for us to take time to care for our soul through prayer, worship, and actively maintaining our relationship with God. Tending to our souls should hold a place of highest priority. This month, the second grade students will learn how to tend to their souls through prayer, especially in the context of preparation for the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Eucharist.
