The Legislature Lurches to Completion

With the regular session of the Washington State Legislature rapidly coming to a conclusion, many fiscal issues remain up in the air. Since the last date for bills to be heard and passed out of the opposite house has come and gone, only bills deemed critical to reducing the state budget have survived and been included in each house's proposed biennial spending plan. Many fiscal issues are being considered in the 2011-13 Budget. There are proposed deep cuts to all discretionary spending including education, health, transportation, and government operations. This, coupled with a dismal forecast in revenue projections for the next two years, have legislators on both sides of the aisle wondering what to do next.

WFIS and our member schools have worked diligently to make our concerns and needs known to both Governor Gregoire and both houses of the legislature during this session. The only bill we were following which has survived the cut off dates is SSB 5639, the educational governance bill proposed by the Governor. This bill would establish a Department of Education to be overseen by a Secretary of Education appointed by the Governor. It would also eliminate several educational agencies, like the State Board of Education, the Early Learning Advisory Council and others. After a proposal to constitutionally eliminate the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction failed to resonate with lawmakers and voters alike, the Governor proposed to have the appointed Secretary of Education, the OSPI and the Early Learning Department work together (the Higher Education Coordinating Board was also eliminated). This has really confused many on the validity and the constitutionality of the Governor's plan, since the whole point for the change was to provide seamless collaboration from early childhood to career within the framework of our state constitution.

Initially, all previous private school representation was eliminated, but--due to quick action by WFIS--it was later included in the striker amendment from the House bill that passed the Senate Education Committee before its stall in Senate Ways and Means.

February 10, 2011 Winter Dinner and Best of Washington Awards Even though this bill was not voted out of the Senate Ways and Means Committee, it has still been included as part of the Senate Budget and is therefore still a live bill. The House, however, did not include this bill language or fiscal implication in their version of the budget. Since both the House and Senate Budgets must be reconciled before it is sent to the Governor for signature, it is questionable that this bill will survive budget reconciliation. Governor Gregoire is adamant that this new Department of Education be included in any budget that she will sign, so if the legislature cannot come to agreement on how to proceed with this landmark change, the Governor has vowed to call a special session. We will keep you informed as the legislature proceeds to its finish.

Thanks to all who have written letters and e-mails, called your legislators and supported our efforts by testifying at hearings. Your voices have had a huge impact for private education in our state, and your membership in the Washington Federation of Independent Schools provides for this representation on your behalf.

The Other Washington

In March I spent several days in Washington, D. C. at the annual State CAPE Network meeting. At our meeting, my counterparts from other states and I discussed a number of issues and concerns. We attended a number of briefings from members of Congress, legislative staff, the US Department of Education and some think tank analysts. Our discussions focused on tax credit legislation, the increasing presence of charter schools, educational spending and the re-authorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, currently titled NCLB. It appears that federal educational spending will either remain fairly flat or be reduced. The only consensus from those who spoke was that Title I will be unaffected. While our discussions about the impasse regarding this year's federal budget have been put to rest, the bigger battle continues to rage over next year's budget. Not only do most Republicans and Democrats fail to see eye-to-eye, there is also a rift in the Republican Party over the depth of spending cuts. Add President Obama's proposed budget to the mix and we currently have gridlock.

There is cautious optimism that the ESEA reauthorization will be completed this year. President Obama would like to see these changes enacted into law prior to the start of the 2011-12 school year. While this seems implausible to many, citing they see mostly smaller proposals passing that eliminate the most onerous parts of NCLB.

Private Schools Advisory Committee Meets in Olympia

On Wednesday, April 13, private school representatives from all constituency groups met with Martin Mueller, Assistant Superintendent for Private School Programs. The meeting was chaired by Don Johnson, Superintendent of Cascade Christian Schools. Highlights from the OSPI report include:

- Private School Approval forms will be e-mailed to all private schools on April 29. Forms must be completed and returned by June 14 for approval at the July SBE meeting.
- The Senate budget cuts 3% from teachers and changes reimbursement formula for public schools to an average daily attendance model, saving the state huge amounts of monies.
- E-Certification bill and appropriations are in place to move to a total electronic renewal system. The state has also developed an electronic warehouse where teachers can log all of their own clock hours.
- The National Common Core Standards are poised to be adopted by the state. This may impact curriculum for those schools that send students to public schools for their next level of education.
- The Zac Leistad Law regarding head injuries was passed and is being implemented by the WIAA. It defines who can clear a student and when they can be cleared to participate in sports after having a head injury.
- The new Core 24 high school graduation requirements have been approved, but will not be implemented until there is funding available

The remainder of the meeting was framed around a discussion about Early Learning, its impact and inconsistencies as they relate to

private schools. Dr. Bette Hyde, Head of the Department of Early Learning and Superintendent Randy Dorn provided their perspective on this issue and listened to the needs and concerns of those private school constituencies around the table. The private schools were asked to make a list of all of the licensing disconnects and issues that negatively impact them. This list will be compiled by the PSAC and addressed by the DEL and OSPI.

CAPE Update: Opportunity Scholarships Program Reauthorized (April 15, 2011)

The fiscal year 2011 spending bill that Congress approved yesterday and President Obama will sign into law today reauthorizes the program that allows low-income students in the District of Columbia to use federally funded scholarships to attend religious and independent schools.

The bipartisan budget plan includes the Scholarships for Opportunity and Results (SOAR) Act that the House approved as a stand-alone bill last month. Enactment of the legislation means that new students will be able to attend schools starting this fall using scholarships worth up to \$8,000 in grades K-8 and up to \$12,000 in grades 9-12. Priority will be given to students whose scholarships were rescinded when Congress closed the program to new students in 2009.

Inclusion of the SOAR Act in the compromise legislation came at the insistence of House Speaker John Boehner (R-OH), a passionate and steadfast supporter of the program from the start. Its enactment offers a future full of hope for disadvantaged students, and perhaps not only in the nation's capital. An article in today's edition of The New York Times suggests that the legislation is helping to fuel the revival of school vouchers across the country.
