The Human Person: According to John Paul II (Book) Bransfield, J. Brian, Pauline Books & Media, 2010. In the 20th Century three social revolutions--the industrial, sexual and technological revolutions--challenged the religious convictions of many. John Paul II's teaching on the theology of the body was his response to the resulting societal shifts. In this volume, Fr. Bransfield explores John Paul's response to the challenges raised by these revolutions. In this context Bransfield then explores how TOB leads us to live the fullness of the Christian life. (S,A)

Athletic, handsome, and always good for a laugh, Pier Giorgio Frassati was the charismatic leader of a band of rowdy friends. He smoked, pulled pranks, relished extreme sports, fiercely debated politics into the night... and secretly gave away his wealth to help the poor: a mother unexpectedly widowed, a homeless invalid, a boy without warm clothes... and plunged eagerly into intense experiences of Eucharistic prayer. My Own Four Walls (DVD, 21 min.) HEAR US, Inc., 2006. Program features personal accounts of homelessness among children and youth living in rural and suburban communities around the country. (I,J,S,A)

This Is What Solidarity Looks Like (DVD, 6 min.) Catholic Relief Services, 2010. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and Catholic Relief Services call on one million Catholics in the United States to confront global poverty. Advocate with us to end hunger, disease, conflict, and other issues that affect the lives of our brothers and sisters worldwide. This short DVD explains and shows examples of how parishes can be effective in participating in this effort. (S,A)

Nickel and Dimed: On (not) Getting by in America (Book) Ehrenreich, Barbara, Metropolitan Books, 2001. Nickel and Dimed reveals low-wage America in all its tenacity, anxiety, and surprising generosity -- a land of Big Boxes, fast food, and a thousand desperate strategies for survival. Instantly acclaimed for its insight, humor, and passion, this book is changing the way America perceives its working poor. (S,A)

Scenes from a Parish (DVD, 85 min.) Lost Nation Pictures, 2008. When a young, irreverent priest arrives at St. Patrick Parish in Lawrence, Massachusetts, he discovers the unexpected--boiling ethnic tensions in a changing working-class community. Father O'Brien works with the parish diligently to build a community center and pantry to feed the area's poor. (S,A)



Dorothy Day: Don't Call Me a Saint (DVD, 57 min.) One Lucky Dog Productions, .2007. Tells the story of the New York writer and social reformer whom the Vatican is considering for canonization. The film begins at the height of the Depression with Dorothy meeting the French peasant philosopher, Peter Maurin. Together they created the Catholic Worker, a peace and justice movement that persists to this day in hospitality houses and soup kitchens around the world. Taken from back cover. (S,A)

Room at the Inn (DVD, 150 min.) San Damiano Foundation, 2006. Tells the inspirational story of the St. Francis Inn, a soup kitchen located in the Kensington area of Philadelphia. The Inn is operated by a community of Franciscan friars, sisters and lay people dedicated to living a life of service among the poor. (S,A)

A Framework for Understanding Poverty

(Book) Payne, Ruby K., 4th rev. ed. Aha! Process, 2005. Poverty is not just a condition of not having enough money. It is a realm of rules, emotions, and knowledge that override all other ways of building relationships and making a life. This book is a guide and exercise for middle-class teachers, who often don't connect with their impoverished students--largely because they don't understand the hidden rules of poverty In the same way, poor children misconnect with school because they don't understand the hidden rules of middle-class life. Ruby Payne, a former teacher and principal who has been a member of all three of the economic cultures of our time (poor, middle-class, and wealthy) compassionately and dispassionately describes the hidden rules and knowledge of each, then takes a pivotal next step by offering proven tools educators can use immediately to improve the quality of instruction in their classrooms.
