Second Annual "Outstanding Educators" Recognition Reception

Fifteen area teachers were awarded "Outstanding Educator" honors on February 13, 2012, in a ceremony at the Poulsbo City Hall Council Chambers. This was the second year such recognition has been made by Alpha Sigma Chapter, Kitsap County, DKG, to publicly acknowledge these men and women for their achievements, dedication and outstanding service

Many teachers provide exceptional education to our children year after year, but are seldom recognized publicly for being the "heroes" that they are. Alpha Sigma Chapter tries to correct that omission with this annual honoring. Poulsbo Mayor Becky Erickson congratulated the teachers, thanking them for their commitment to our community's children. She noted the importance of good teachers and good schools to a healthy community as she handed out the awards.

Two women, who have taught for less than three years, were recognized as "Outstanding New Educators," each demonstrating a level of competency that far exceeds their brief experiences as teachers. They were Stephanie Black (special education, Woodlands Elementary), and Kate Orizotti (4th grade, St. Cecilia's Catholic School).

Thirteen teachers were honored as "Outstanding Educators" for consistent exemplary instructional skills, achieving high degrees of

student success, and leadership in school improvement. They were selected based on their reputations amongst parents, administrators and colleagues. Recipients were: Kristy Dressler (4th grade, Suguamish), Cindy Dudley (occupational therapist, Wolfle), Sheila Fagan-Trunkey (grade 3, Pearson), Christine Fraser (math, Poulsbo Middle School/NKEA president), Lisa Hale (math, Woodward Middle School), Laurie Harney (grade 3, Poulsbo), and Kiersti Johnson (kindergarten, Poulsbo). Also honored were Dan McLean (math. Bainbridge High), Kelly Morgan (speech therapist, Poulsbo Elementary), Debra Pavlich-Boaz (learning specialist, Briedablik), Cindy Purser-Drover (Native American liaison, Suguamish), Chris Re' (4th grade, Gordon), and Elizabeth Roberts (librarian, Woodlands).

These teachers hold themselves to a high degree of accountability, are innovative, results-oriented and student-centered. They are an invaluable resource to the other staff they work with and beloved by students. Nominators testified to the sacrifices made by these individuals, the impact of their work outside their classrooms, and their spirit of service and fun.

Mayor Erickson noted that "students will remember the gifts of these teachers long after they leave their classrooms. They have influence on the lives of their students even into adulthood."

Area X Hosts Successful Teacher Seminar

Area X was fortunate to receive a Lucille Cornetet Seminar grant from the Education Foundation of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International which provided major support for a teacher seminar held on January 12, 2012. The focus of the seminar was on "Effective Instruction for Homeless and High Poverty Students."

The 3.5 hour seminar included a one hour panel of local service providers discussing the educational impact of homelessness and high poverty, the needs of these children and families, and how educators can assist families to access services. Following the panel, Dr. Julia Aguirre, Associate Professor of Graduate Education, U. of Washington, Tacoma, provided a 2.5 hour presentation entitled "Engage, Enrich, and Empower Young Mathematical Minds." The talk and interaction amongst participants focused on three aspects of effective math instruction for children in high poverty: (1) high quality math content, (2) building strong school/family and student/teacher relationships, and (3) using math to challenge socio-political inequities. A lesson planning/evaluation rubric was presented which included assessing if a lesson used math as a tool to analyze authentic socio-political problems from

within the student's familial and/or community and cultural context.

Eighty-one people attended the seminar which was offered for clock hours, coming from as far away as Port Angeles and Tacoma. Participants gave the seminar high marks. (100% strongly agreeing or agreeing on facilitator preparation, pacing, handling of questions, materials and visual aides, and time allowed for reflection. 98% strongly agreed or agreed that they gained new knowledge, content was applicable to real-life job situations, they had opportunity to learn from peers. and course objectives were met).

In addition to the Lucille Cornetet grant, funding for the seminar came from the Poulsbo North Kitsap Rotary, the North Kitsap School District Title I program and donations from chapters in area X: Alpha Sigma, Nu and Alpha Upsilon. Food for the seminar was provided by the Alpha Sigma Chapter. The program was further supported by Olympic Educational Service District 114 and the Olympic Uniserve Office of WEA. This was the second seminar offered in the Closing the Achievement Gap series begun last year by Alpha Sigma chapter. Last year's topic was on "Parent Involvement in Multi-cultural Schools." and was also offered for clock hours.

The Board of Trustees of the Rachel Royston Permanent Scholarship was pleased to announce that two members of the Alpha Sigma Chapter, Trang McGillvray and Laurie James, have been awarded scholarships for 2012-2013. FOOD BANKS IN GREAT NEED!

Here are the March list items we are emphasizing that are needed NOW at Bremerton Foodline and other Food banks: **FOOD**

- *Cereal (boxed or bagged any size and any kind) *Note that a partner business, Grocery Outlet, is a good source for products
- *Canned Meat (Tuna, chicken, salmon, SPAM; No Sardines)
- ... *Canned Fruits (Pears, Mandarin Oranges, Pineapple or other fruit –no Snow-Kist Applesauce)
- *Packaged Dinners (generic hamburger helper or tuna helpers in any variety)
- *Ramen Noodles or Cup of Soups (any variety)
- *Bulk Rice (we repackage)
- *Canned soups (any type; pull-tops go to homeless distribution)
- *Juice Boxes (the type used for kids at school)
- *Canned or Bottled Juice (any flavor)

Non-FOOD

- *Toilet Paper *Powdered Laundry Detergent *Bar soap *Baby Wipes
- *Small can openers (old-fashioned military openers would be welcome; homeless persons have a hard time with cans *Pet Food and Dollar Tree openers don't hold up well) *Diapers (baby & adult)

Please consider saving all your plastic grocery store bags & donating them to the Food Banks
