





Pope Benedict XVI: Christians Must Not Compromise Christ's Truth



Marking the feast of the martyrdom of St. John the Baptist, Pope Benedict XVI said Christians must not bow to the pressure of the powerful who demand a denial of Christ or of the truth he taught. "The truth is the truth and there is no compromise," the pope said. He also said St. John the Baptist, "out of love for the truth, would not compromise with the powerful" who wanted him to deny Christ.

Celebrating the martyrdom of St. John the Baptist is a reminder that "we cannot accept compromises about the love of Christ, his word, his truth," he said. Pope Benedict said St. John's strength to preach conversion, to lead people to Jesus and to face martyrdom flowed from prayer and a total reliance on God. The periods St. John spent in the desert were part of his preparation. The desert is a place "where man experiences his own poverty because, deprived of support and material security, he understands that the only solid point of reference remaining is God," the pope said.

The Baptist's example of prayer, he said, teaches believers that "prayer isn't time wasted, it does not steal time away from work -- even apostolic work." Rather, he said, St. John the Baptist's life is a reminder that "only if we have a faithful, constant, trusting prayer life, God himself will give us the ability and strength to live happily and serenely, to overcome difficulty and witness to him courageously."

Catholic Vacation Bible School is Family Mission



As the 2012 vacation Bible school season comes to a close, an Indiana family of faith-filled and creative women can look back with pride at offering a Catholic alternative to the traditionally Protestant-based programs. After a discussion with a neighbor in 2001 about the lack of available Catholic programs, Melissa Kaiser, a parishioner at St. Vincent de Paul Parish in Fort

Wayne and mother of seven children, gathered her own mother, Margaret Windle, and sisters Maryalice Beach and Susan Lawson to brainstorm ideas for a fully Catholic vacation Bible school. With the decision to begin with teachings on the Trinity, the idea for "St. Patrick and the Holy Trinity Catholic VBS" program was born. The women were soon developing lesson plans that incorporated the sacraments, Catholic values and virtues, Scripture and stories of saints for kindergarten through sixth grade.

By 2004, Our Lady of the Hills Parish in South Carolina, where Lawson resides, was piloting the first program with great success. And the program grew in popularity across the country. Since then, this family of catechists has developed five programs, all of which have the bishop's imprimatur, an official approval that the content is in line with Catholic teachings. Each of the five easy-to-use, pull-and-go programs is organized in a five-day thematic format. Each program incorporates a book written on a specific saint to study, and concludes with

POPE BENEDICT XVI ON HUMANITY & THE INFINITE



insights into this relationship.

On August 10, Pope Benedict XVI sent a message to the *Meeting for Friendship Among Peoples*, sponsored by the *Catholic Communion and Liberation Movement* in Rimini, Italy. The theme of this year's meeting is *The nature of man is a relationship with the infinite*, and the Holy Father offered

Pope Benedict XVI pointed out that to speak of man and of his yearning for the infinite means, first and foremost, to recognize his constitutive relationship with the Creator. He affirmed that humanity is called into life in order to enter into relationship with Life itself, with God, and that every person is created so that he may enter into dialogue with the Infinite. The pontiff recognized that humans often run the risk of being absolutized and thus become idols that replace the Creator, and that to live up to his being, man must turn and recognize that he is a creature, who is dependent on God.

Pope Benedict XVI also reflected on the mystery of the Incarnation, noting that through this mystery God reaffirmed the sanctity of all creation: Nothing, then, is banal or insignificant along the path of life and of the world. Man is made for an infinite God who became flesh, who assumed our humanity in order to draw us to the heights of his divine being.

Catholics and the Environment



In *Australian Catholics Magazine*, Fr. Andrew Hamilton, SJ, wrote an article titled *Catholics and the Environment* in which he addresses a key question: How does Christian faith lead us to see the environment?

Fr. Hamilton points out that Scripture highlights three features of creation – its beauty, its complexity and our responsibility for it – [which] colour the way in which we should see the world. He discusses the Catholic principle of solidarity in light of both the human and non-human creation. He also calls attention to how Jesus' life and ministry serves as a model for how we are called to care for creation. Finally, Fr. Hamilton notes that environmental degradation is often due to sin and selfishness, and invites us to reflect on how authentic Christian living can lead us to more fully care for God's good gift of creation.

The pope prayed that being an altar server would help the young people deepen their friendship with Christ and enthusiastically share God's love with their friends and families. "And, if one day you feel called to follow the path to the priesthood or



religious life, respond generously," he told the youngsters.

Taylor's piece you might like a similar story about his own dad's experience in buying a new car. It's a reminder that success "is about passion, emotion, identity — sharing your values."

One of the more heart-warming stories to zoom around the Internet lately involves a

young man, his dying grandmother, and a bowl of clam chowder from Panera Bread. It's <u>a little story that offers big lessons</u> about service, brands, and the human side of business — a story that underscores why efficiency should never come at the expense of humanity.



It was a small act of kindness that would not normally make headlines. Except that Brandon told the story on his Facebook page, and Brandon's mother, Gail Cook, retold the story on Panera's fan page. The rest, as they say, is social-media history. Gail's post generated 500,000 (and counting) "likes" and more than 22,000 comments on Panera's Facebook page. Panera, meanwhile, got something that no amount of traditional advertising can buy — a genuine sense of affiliation and appreciation from customers around the world.

...But I see the reaction to Sue Fortier's gesture as an example of something else — the hunger among customers, employees, and all of us to engage with companies on more than just dollars-and-cents terms. In a world that is being reshaped by the relentless advance of technology, what stands out are acts of compassion and connection that remind us what it means to be human.

Bezos's calculations may have been accurate — but the reaction was not what he expected. His grandmother burst into tears.... "My grandfather looked at me, and after a bit of silence, he gently and calmly said, 'Jeff, one day you'll understand that it's harder to be kind than clever.""

...So by all means, encourage your people to embrace technology, get great at business analytics, and otherwise ramp up the efficiency of everything they do. But just make sure all their efficiency doesn't come at the expense of their *humanity*. Small gestures can send big signals about who we are, what we care about, and why people should want to affiliate with us. It's harder (and more important) to be kind than clever.




Reading the Old Testament: An Introduction; Second Edition
