Dear Father, Pastoral Coordinator, and School Principal,

On June 15, 2012, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced a deferred action on the deportation of young people who entered the U.S. before the age of 16. Individuals who demonstrate that they meet certain criteria will be eligible to receive deferred action for a period of two years, subject to renewal, and will be able to apply for work authorization. U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) began accepting applications for consideration of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) on August 15, 2012.

Deferred action permits an individual to remain in the United States temporarily with legal status but does not provide a path to permanent residence or citizenship.

While the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops supports DACA, the bishops continue to advocate for comprehensive immigration reform. They understand that DACA is temporary, uncertain, and holds risks for those who apply for deferred action. At present, no one knows how the government will evaluate the applications or how it will use the information provided by applicants. Although we support the goals of the DACA program, as it would provide some protection from deportation (and so keep families together), we urge potential applicants to seek legal counsel before submitting any paperwork to the government. There are a number of things parishes and schools can do to help to people wanting to apply for DACA. Here are some suggestions:

- Childhood arrivals will be searching for sacramental and school records that will help them meet eligibility criteria for deferred action. We encourage parishes and schools to provide them with the records they need.
- The immigrant rights organizations are seeking meeting space to hold DACA information sessions. Please consider making parish and schools facilities available if approached by such organizations.
- Publish and/or distribute information about the information sessions in your area in parish and school bulletins.

We know it will be a difficult decision for many young people to make. Therefore, we want to offer spiritual support for these individuals and families to make a good discernment. Enclosed with this letter, you will find a prayer for the spiritual support of childhood arrivals.
