#### The Joy of the Gospel

Earlier today, the Vatican released Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, *The Joy of the Gospel*. Economic inequality is among the situations addressed by the Pope. The following are three brief excerpts from the synthesis prepared by the Vatican Information Service:

"The joy of the Gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus"; thus begins the Apostolic Exhortation "Evangelii Gaudium", by which Pope Francis develops the theme of the proclamation of the Gospel in the contemporary world, drawn from, among other sources, the contribution of the work of the Synod held in the Vatican from 7 to 28 October 2012 on the theme "The new evangelization for the transmission of the faith".

In relation to the challenges of the contemporary world, the Pope denounces the current economic system as "unjust at its root". "Such an economy kills" because the law of "the survival of the fittest" prevails. The current culture of the "disposable" has created "something new": "the excluded are not the 'exploited' but the outcast, the 'leftovers'".

"Among the vulnerable for whom the Church wishes to care with particular love and concern are unborn children, the most defenseless and innocent among us. Nowadays efforts are made to deny them their human dignity". "The Church cannot be expected to change her position on this question ... it is not 'progressive' to try to resolve problems by eliminating a

human life". The Pope makes an appeal for respect for all creation: we "are called to watch over and protect the fragile world in which we live".
