

Pope at General Audience: The Key to Counsel Is Prayer

Pope Francis has continued his catechesis on the gifts of the Holy Spirit, this week discussing the third gift, counsel and how prayer is needed for counsel. Relating to those present, he said, "We know how important it is, in the most difficult moments, to be able to

count on the suggestions of wise persons who love us."

Yet, the Pope added how the faithful must not forget that we can count on the one who is wisest. Through the gift of counsel, he said, "it is God Himself, with his Spirit, who illumines our heart, to make us understand the right way to speak and to behave and the way to follow." Counsel, therefore, is the gift with which the "Holy Spirit renders our conscience capable of making a concrete choice in communion with God, according to the logic of Jesus and of his Gospel," said Pope Francis.

Francis explained that the Spirit helps us "not to fall prey to egoism or our own way of seeing things" since he "makes us grow interiorly ... grow positively ... and grow in the community." In short, he said he "helps us to grow" and "to live in community. The essential condition to preserve this gift is prayer, the Pontiff stressed. "We always come back to the same subject: prayer! But prayer is so important. To pray with the prayers that we all know from childhood, but also to pray with our own words. To pray to the Lord: 'Lord, help me, counsel me, what must I do now?"

With prayer, he said, "we make room for the Spirit to come to help us at that moment. To counsel us on what we must all do. Prayer, never forget prayer! Never!" Inviting those present to pray whenever you can 'squeeze it in,' the Pontiff reminded them that, "No one, no one is aware when we pray on the bus, on the street: we pray in silence with our heart." Therefore, "let us take advantage of these moments to pray, to pray that the Spirit will give us this gift of counsel," he said.

"The moment we receive him and host him in our heart, the Holy Spirit begins immediately to make us sensitive to his voice and to direct our thoughts, sentiments and intentions according to God's heart." This "intimacy" with God and listening to his Word, he said, "little by little," allows us to "put aside our personal logic, dictated most often by our closures, our prejudices and our ambitions," adding that we instead "learn to ask the Lord: what is your desire? What is your will? What pleases you?"

"Although the Spirit is the one who counsels us, we must make room for the Spirit, so he can counsel us," said Francis, adding that "to make room is to pray, to pray so that He will come and help us always." Pope Urges Faithful to Pick Up Their Rosaries



During this month of May dedicated to Mary, Pope Francis has invited the faithful to pick up their rosaries and call upon her in a special way. The Pontiff urged the faithful to invoke Mary's intercession, "so that the Lord may grant mercy and peace to the Church and to all the world," and encouraged them to take special care to pray the rosary during this month of May.

Hispanic Growth Is Strength but Also Challenge for U.S. Catholic Church

The Roman Catholic Church has known for years that its future in the United States depends heavily on Hispanics. The church, which is the largest religious denomination in the country, is already about 40 percent Hispanic, and the demographic change is inexorable: Within the next few decades, Hispanics are expected to make up a majority of American Catholics.

The influx of Hispanics has been a stabilizing factor for the church. Were it not for immigration, Catholicism in the United States would be dwindling as non-immigrant Catholics drift away from the church. But the changing makeup of American Catholicism also poses challenges, starting with the problem that much of the physical and political infrastructure of the church is concentrated in the Northeast and Midwest, while much of the immigration-fueled growth is in the Southwest and West.

Hispanic Catholics differ from other American Catholics in a number of striking, and significant, ways: Hispanic parents have been much less likely to send their children to Catholic schools, and their sons have been less likely to pursue the priesthood.



A researcher at Boston College, Hosffman Ospino, has undertaken a new effort to understand the behavior of Hispanic American Catholics, and the implications for the larger church. In a study released Monday, Mr. Ospino finds a relatively high level of participation in church sacraments, but a low level of participation in other aspects of parish life, and a concerning lack of personnel and financial resources in parishes with high numbers of Hispanics.

"There is a bleak picture in terms of resources," Mr. Ospino said. "And it is noticeable that at higher levels of leadership, the number of Hispanics are lower."

"There are already predictions about the death of the parish in America," said Ospino. "If we fail to address the issues facing

Hispanic Catholics and the parishes that serve them, then the parish structure in America will experience a dramatic decline as it did in Europe."


There are also positive findings: Mass attendance in parishes with Hispanic ministries is 22 percent higher than in the average parish, a promising sign in a church that has seen attendance at Masses dropping over the last few decades. Rates of baptism and first communions are also higher.



But attendance rates at weekday Mass are quite low, participation in non-sacramental activities like youth groups is low, and contributions to collection are also low, often reflecting economic hardship. Parishes serving Hispanics often have fewer staffers per parishioner than other parishes,

according to the study; parishes with high numbers of Hispanic parishioners are also less likely to have a parish school.

The study was based on surveys of parishes with Hispanic ministries; data collection and analysis was conducted by Boston College, in collaboration with the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate at Georgetown University.

The study is the first of two being released this week examining the religious lives of American Hispanics. On Wednesday, the Pew Research Center released results of a large poll examining religious identity among Hispanics in the United States. Here are a few items from that report which can be read at *The Shifting Religious Identity of Latinos*.

Hispanic Americans are increasingly likely to leave the Catholic Church, a major survey by the Pew Research Center has shown.

Today 55% of America's 35 million Hispanic adults identify themselves as Catholic, Pew found. As recently as 2010, that figure was 67%.

Almost one-fourth of all Hispanic adults living in the US today—24%-- are former Catholics. The tendency to leave the Catholic Church was most pronounced among younger Hispanics, suggesting that the trend could accelerate.

When asked why they had left the Catholic Church, a majority of respondents (55%) said that they had merely "drifted away," and 52% said they had ceased to believe the teachings of the Church. However a large number reported that they had found another religious community that was responsive to their needs.

Open Parish Doors To Evangelize, Urges Pope



In a meeting with nearly 7,000 members of the Italian lay movement Catholic Action, Pope Francis spoke of the need for parishes to be open and outgoing. "It's a matter of opening the doors and allowing Jesus to be able to go outside. Many times we have Jesus closed inside the parish with us, and we don't go outside and we don't let him go out!" said the Pope on May 3. "Open the doors because He


goes, at least He does! It's a matter of an 'outgoing' Church: a Church always going out."

Pope Francis encouraged the many Catholic Action members gathered in Rome's Paul VI Audience Hall to continue their work of evangelization in the parishes, "especially those marked by tiredness and closure--and there are many." "When I greet the parish secretaries, I ask them: 'but are you the secretaries that open the door or those who close the door?' These parishes need your apostolic enthusiasm, your full availability, and your creative service," he continued.

Pope Francis then reflected on three verbs that indicated the style of evangelization necessary to Catholic Action: to remain, to go, and to rejoice. All faithful Catholics are called to be "heralds and witnesses of Christ" and must remain close to Jesus. It is in the "encounter with the One who is our life and our joy, that our testimony acquires new meaning and new strength every day," said the Pope.

But it is not enough to remain static in one's faith, stressed the Pope. "Never stop: go forward!" he exclaimed. "Go along the streets of your cities and of your countries, and announce that God is Father and that Jesus Christ has made himself known to you, and through this, your lives have changed. Finally, rejoice. Rejoice and exult in the Lord always! Be people who sing life, sing faith!"

Pope Paul VI to be Beatified October 19th



The Vatican has announced that Pope Francis signed a decree Friday confirming that a miracle, attributed to the intercession of the late Pope Paul VI, is authentic and that the former pope will be beatified at the Vatican on October 19th.

Giovanni Battista Montini was born on 26th September 1897 in Concesio, Italy, and died on 6 August 1978 in Castel Gandolfo, the Vatican stated.

Theologians and doctors attested that the healing of a child from California, who was expected to be born with severe brain damage, cannot be explained on medical grounds. The child was born in the 1990s and is now a healthy

teenager.

The Congregation for the Causes of Saints last week unanimously agreed that the healing was a miracle. Pope Francis issued a decree confirming its authenticity during a private audience with the prefect of the Congregation, Cardinal Angelo Amato.

Third Fortnight for Freedom to be Observed June 21-July 4



Catholic dioceses and parishes across the United States are once again encouraged to raise awareness for domestic and international religious freedom concerns during the third annual Fortnight for Freedom, June 21-



July 4. The two-week celebration will focus on the theme, "Freedom to Serve," emphasizing the link between religious liberty and service to the poor and vulnerable.

"During the Fortnight, our liturgical calendar celebrates great martyrs who

remained faithful in the face of persecution by political power—St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More, John the Baptist, Peter and Paul and the first martyrs of the Church of Rome," said Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore, chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee for Religious Liberty of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). "This is a time when Catholics can unite themselves in prayer to the men and women throughout history who spread the Gospel and lived out Jesus' call to serve the 'least of these' in even the direst of circumstances."



Two nationally televised Masses will bookend the Fortnight. Archbishop Lori will celebrate Mass at the Baltimore Basilica on June 21, at 5:30 p.m. EDT. Cardinal Donald W. Wuerl of Washington will celebrate Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington on July 4, at noon EDT. USCCB President Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz of Louisville, Kentucky, will be the homilist at the July 4 Mass.

USCCB has prepared materials to help dioceses and parishes participate in the Fortnight, including templates and guides for special prayer services, a list of frequently asked questions about religious liberty, one-page fact sheets on current threats to religious freedom in the U.S. and around the world, and a study guide on Dignitatis Humanae, the Second Vatican Council's Declaration on Religious Freedom.





The Church's teachings about moderation seems to echo in my thoughts and

...Why is "Look Up" rocketing around the Web? Besides its good production values, sentimental charm, catchy rhythm and <u>celebrity endorsements</u>, the poem resonates because it can be so difficult in the digital age to find things like authentic companionship or even some old-fashioned, disconnected peace and quiet.

...So Turk aptly notices a problem and prescribes a solution. But the poem's puritanical streak doesn't leave room for all the good things technology and social media offer. In a Catholic worldview, no tool is inherently bad. It's all about prudence, not wholesale rejection.

...Not only is this fairy-tale love story Pollyannaish and emotionally manipulative, but by including it in his screed against social media, Turk unconsciously belittles the practice of online dating, a much more promising romantic strategy than street-corner conversation and one that really does not need any new derision.

...Virtual interaction isn't a substitute for in-the-flesh companionship, but it doesn't have to be one or the other. If my phone is a tool that I use in moderation to spark or grow relationships, broaden my knowledge about the world, and deepen my faith, I am using it

well. If it interrupts dinner conversation because I'm scrolling through Twitter, I am not using it well.


Mary's Song


