Civic Holidays

As the United States celebrates a three-day weekend, the faithful celebrate Independence Day on Friday, the Fourth of July. In addition to your customary barbeques, watermelon in the park, and of course fireworks don't neglect the propers for the Mass (*Roman Missal*, Proper of Saints July 4, *Lectionary* 887-891). This is a great opportunity to foster the recreation of our nation through justice. As we think about all that is embodied in that American spirit of welcoming the stranger and giving everyone a voice and stirred with compassion by seeing anew the tolls exacted in the struggle for liberty and religious freedom throughout the world we are reminded about the moral imperative, both as Roman Catholics and as Americans, to both pray for and actively seek out justice for immigrants. As liturgy sends out into the world "to glorify the Lord by our life" we cannot fail to incorporate faithful citizenship into our celebrations.

We begin the first day in September with Labor Day which, beyond merely signaling the close of the summer months, is an opportunity to remember the importance both our nation and the Catholic tradition gives to the dignity of work. This year as your parish celebrates the Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time it would be good to include not only among the Prayer of the Faithful petitions for laborers, especially those whose lack of legal status places them at greatest risk for exploitation, but also to have the dignity of workers reflected in the preaching, music, and remarks in order to emphasize the way in which "the work of human hands" cooperates with God's plan of salvation.

Assumption

Because the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary on August 15 falls on a Friday this year, it **is** observed as a holy day of obligation. One of the characteristics of the Assumption is that both the *Roman Missal* and the *Lectionary* provide texts for a proper vigil (*Roman Missal*, Proper of Saints August 15, *Lectionary* 621). These texts are a valuable catechetical tool for catechumens even if the parish doesn't make use of the vigil itself.

In addition to the solemnities of the Sacred Heart (June 27, 2014) and Assumption, these next few months of July and August are filled with several of our most illustrative holy men and women. Saint Benedict is remembered on July 11. Those of us engaged in the liturgy need the intercession of Saint Benedict even more than most! In his *Rule*, Saint Benedict reminds us that we need to begin all good works in prayer (*RB* Prologue), should consider prayer - the work of God - the most important thing we do (*RB* 43.3), though balance such with both manual labor and *lectio divina* (*RB* 48.1). St. Martin's University in Lacey is the only Benedictine university west of the Rocky Mountains. Established in 1895 by monks of the Roman Catholic Order of Saint Benedict, the Saint Martin's community is shaped by its Benedictine heritage; a heritage characterized by a commitment to intellectual and spiritual growth, hospitality, and service.

Saint Bernard of Clairvaux, *Doctor Mellifluus*, is remembered on August 20 as the reformer of the Benedictine tradition and the most influential of the Cistercian Fathers and therefore father of the later reformed Cistercians usually known as Trappists.

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha, the Lily of the Mohawk and of particular importance to Native American Catholics, should be highlighted on her July 14 memorial, with <u>proper prayers</u>. The canonization of Saint Kateri has special meaning for the Church in Western Washington because the miracle that opened the way for her canonization took place in our own archdiocese, with the miraculous healing of Jake Finkbonner, a young Ferndale boy who was attacked by flesh-eating bacteria in 2006. Jake, a student at Assumption School in Bellingham, and his family were present when Kateri was canonized on October 21, 2012.

On July 15 we honor the great Franciscan scholastic theologian, Saint Bonaventure known as the Seraphic Doctor. During the subsequent month (August 8) we along with the Dominican Friars at Blessed Sacrament in Seattle celebrate his contemporary, the founder of he other great mendicant order, the Order of Preachers, Saint Dominic. Three days later we celebrate Saint Clare, companion to Saint Francis of Assisi.

Several saints who lived during the lifetime of Jesus honored during the last week of July including Saint Mary Magdalen, Apostle to the Apostles (July 22), Saint James the Apostle (July 25), Saint Joachim and Saint Anne, parents of Mary, Mother of God (July 26) and Saint Martha (July 29). On August 6 we celebrate the Transfiguration, a solemnity of the Lord. Appearing in the West in the eleventh century, about five hundred years after being first celebrated in the East Syrian tradition, the Transfiguration invites us now as it did when it was promulgated in the West, to consider our own election as the beloved sons and daughters of God as well as raise our awareness of the Holy Land. Finally, of equally ancient origin, we find the Martyrdom of John the Baptist on August 29.

Items from the Chapel of the Christian Brothers

Jesuits and Society of Jesus ministries throughout the world and in our own archdiocese celebrate the patronal solemnity of their founder, Saint Ignatius of Loyola whose influencial *Spiritual Exercises* would likewise make for excellent summer reading as we seek to be recreated.

On the subsequent day, August 1, we remember Saint Alphonsus Ligouri, *Doctor Zelantissimus* (most zealous), known for his moral theology and as the founder of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (C.S.s.R.) considered by many the patron of confessors. No less known among confessors is the Curé of Ars, Saint John Vianney, the patron of parish priests, whom we remember on August 4.

Of an earlier era we celebrate on August 10 the feast of Saint Lawrence, deacon of the early church and Roman martyr. August 27 is set aside to remember Saint Monica whose memorial comes one day before that of her more well known son and Father of the Church, Saint Augustine of Hippo.

As many parishes will be holding Vacation Bible School during these summer months it may be helpful to plan specific liturgies for their benefit at the end of the day as a way to introduce some of these holy men and women to these youngest of the faithful who may not otherwise regularly be able to attend weekday liturgies and who therefore hear almost exclusively from the temporal. Having the saints as role models and helpers for our young people is one of the treasures of the Church and the liturgy.

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Year-round Catechumenate

Just as the Church continues to celebrate the liturgy during the summer though schools may be closed and faith development programs likewise on break, we need to keep in mind that, centered on the liturgy, the catechumenate is meant to keep on going! For those unfamiliar with the idea of a year-round catechumenate we recommend Mary Birmingham's Year-Round Catechumenate (LTP, 2003).

In addition to continuing to celebrate rites and provide catechesis for the catechumens and candidates for reception into the full communion of the Catholic Church entrusted to your parish do not neglect the formation of your Christian initiation team.

In our archdiocese, we are hosting a <u>Team RCIA Institute</u> this fall in order to help ministers of Christian Initiation experience and understand the *RCIA* trough which they are leading others. Many people come to the parish during the summer break either because they have moved to the area to start school and find it an opportune time to formally begin a journey they have long discerned. If we simply expect people to come back in September they will likely already be

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Praying for the Synod of Bishops

With the announcement by Pope Francis of an Extraordinary Synod of Bishops on the Pastoral Challenges to the Family in October and with his call to pray now for the deliberations and work that will be accomplished, pastors and priests may use the formularies given in the *Roman Missal*, Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Occasions, no. 5: "For a Council or a Synod." This Mass may be used on weekdays in Ordinary Time that do not have an obligatory memorial. In addition, all the faithful should exercise their baptismal priesthood by interceding on behalf of the upcoming Synod and by offering, in their personal prayers outside the liturgy, one of the two Collects provided for this Mass:

O God, who care for your peoples with gentleness and rule them with love, endow with spirit of wisdom those to whom you have handed on authority to govern, that your people may be led to know the truth more fully and to grow in holiness according to your will. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Or.

O Lord, ruler and guardian of your Church, pour out, we pray, upon your servants a spirit of truth, understanding and peace, that they may strive with all their heart to know what is pleasing to you and then pursue it with all their strength. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Coming soon: Rite of Marriage Workshop

The English translation and the U.S. Adaptations for the *Rite of Marriage* were approved by the U.S. Bishops at their November 2013 meeting and the texts have been sent to the Holy See for approval.

The Bishops Committee on Divine Worship and the Federation of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions are planning a national workshop on the revised Order for Celebrating Matrimony here in our own archdiocese. This workshop will focus on the Introduction to the Rite, the Ritual changes, various cultural adaptations and best pastoral practices.

Consider the Unity Candle

Alhough a symbolic presence, the unity candle is not an official part of the Church's marriage rite.
