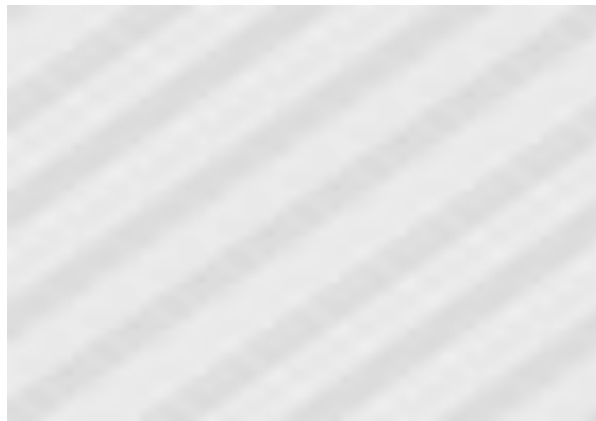

Using Science in the Garden to Manage Slugs and Aphids



Eighth grade students at Einstein Middle School took on a green gardening challenge in response to damaged vegetables in their school garden. Students searched for an organic solution to reduce the presence of slugs and aphids, using the scientific

method to test safer, natural choices.

The class researched safer choices for pest control as a homework assignment, used a Hazards on the Homefront grant to purchase copper tape, marigolds, neem oil, and hazelnuts as potential deterrents, then tested the efficacy of each.

Through this scientific process, the eighth graders determined that lining the sides of raised beds with copper tape best deterred slugs and that spraying diluted neem oil onto plants best deterred aphids and flies. The students presented their findings to parents and faculty at their spring open house.

This project engaged 350 science students in hands-on learning about household hazardous products and environmental health.
