

Durng the meeting of the educational charity Scholas Occurentes, the Pope had a question and answer session with students who came from El Salvador for the Americas, Turkey for Europe, Israel, Australia, and South Africa. The exchange was conducted through "Google Hangout".



In response to a student from El Salvador's question, the Pope warned that communication can also be used in a destructive way, and exhorted them to "Be Careful!" The Pope urged the young people: "Do not be afraid! ... Go forward. Build bridges of peace. Play as a team and make the future better, but remember that the future is in your hands. While dreaming of the future, do not forget your cultural or religious heritage ... With courage! Build the future."

Addressing those gathered at his first daily Mass in Casa Santa Marta after a summer break, Pope Francis asked: "How do I receive Jesus Christ?", to which he responded, "The Church tells us that Jesus is present in the Scriptures, in His Word." This is why, the Holy Father stressed, it is so important to "read a passage from the Gospel during the day." Do we do this just to learn? He responded, "No! To find Jesus! Because Jesus is right there in His Word, in His Gospel." "Every time I read the Gospel, I find Jesus," Pope Francis continued, "Yet how

do I receive this Word? Well, you should receive it like you receive Jesus, that is to say with an open heart, with a humble heart, with the spirit of the Beatitudes." The Holy Father concluded, urging everyone to buy a "cheap" pocket-Gospel, to consult often, if they hadn't done so already







The Gate by Nancy Carabio Belanger




Who is Sam Harrington? by Rick Osborne and K. Christie Bowler; illustrated by Dara Goldman

Preparing for the First Session

During your first session or orientation process, spend time just getting to know your learners and introducing them to you and the classroom.

Play a Name Game

- o <u>Group Juggle</u> Stand in a circle with a ball. The first time around, each person simply says their name when they get the ball and then they toss it to another person (someone who hasn't yet held the ball.) After everyone has said their names once, the person with the ball says their own name and the name of the person to whom they are bopping or tossing the ball. (A beach ball is the most fun for bopping.)
- Name Aerobics Stand in a circle. Tell the group that each person has to come up with a movement to go with the syllables of their name. For example, my name is Cecilia Ce Cil Ia 3 syllables. I would come up with a 3-part movement. The first person shows their name and movement. The second person shows their name and movement and then the first person's. The third person

- shows theirs, the second person's, and the first person's. Continue until you've completed the circle.
- o <u>"I like..."</u> Have everyone stand in the middle of the room. Read some statements where participants have to choose between two things. For example, "I like chocolate ice cream or vanilla ice cream." Those who like chocolate ice cream move to one side of the room. Those who like vanilla ice cream move to the other side of the room. For the first couple of choices, have people introduce themselves to two or three people in the group.
 - Chocolate Ice Cream Vanilla Ice Cream
 - Dogs Cats
 - U of Michigan Michigan State
 - Hockey Baseball
 - Football Soccer
 - Pop Music Rap Music
 - See what other pairs you can come up with.
- o For more ideas, <u>Google "name games," or "getting to know you</u> games."

Introduce yourself

- o Share your name and some information about yourself.
 - What are some of your hobbies? What do you do for fun?
 - What are your favorite movies, music, books, etc.?
- o Tell them why you are excited about being their catechist.

Help your learners become comfortable in the learning area.

- o <u>Be prepared!</u>
 - Have tables and chairs set up ahead of time.
 - Cover bulletin boards with colorful paper, borders, pictures, etc.
 - Prepare your prayer space with a table, cloth the color of the current liturgical season, Bible, and symbols of the season.
 - Have all necessary supplies ready for use.

- o Show and tell your learners what they should do when they first arrive.
 - Sign In Process
 - Parents should sign in their children. They will sign out their children when they pick them up.
 - Older learners can sign themselves in. It's good to
 have a sign in sheet even with adult learners so you
 know who's attending and can follow up with additional
 resources and conversations.
 - Learners can move a craft stick with their name on it from one jar to another to show their presence. (This not only helps with attendance, but helps them take responsibility for their presence.)
 - For younger learners, have them color a picture or do a puzzle or some other activity to keep them occupied while they are waiting for the session to begin.
 - Upper elementary, middle school, high school and adult learners will likely appreciate the time just to talk with one another while they are waiting for the session to begin.
 - Provide a process for learners to get to know one another while they are waiting.
 - o Provide name tags.
 - Provide a "Question of the Week" for them to discuss with one another.

Inform your learners of your expectations

- o How do you expect them to behave?
 - Keep your instructions simple. Three or four "rules" are enough, especially for young learners.
 - Suggestions for Young Learners
 - o Be quiet when someone else is talking.
 - o Keep your hands and feet to yourself.

- Share, but don't take.
- What other ideas do you have for rules of participation for young learners?
- Suggestions for Pre-Teen and Teen Learners
 - o Be quiet when someone else is talking.
 - o Respect the person and property of others.
 - o What is said here, stays here.
 - o What other ideas do you have for rules of participation for pre-teen and teen learners?
- Suggestions for Adult Learners
 - o What is said here, stays here.
 - Everyone has a right to their own opinion. Different opinions help to create conversation and personal growth.
 - What other ideas do you have for "Rules of Engagement" for adult learners?
- Have a signal for the learners to know when it's time to be quiet or transition from one activity to the next.
 - When they see or hear you make the signal, they stop what they're doing, quiet down, and, with young learners, make a sign showing that they are listening.
 - Ring a bell
 - Flash the lights
 - Time Out Hands
 - Hands folded, as if in prayer
 - Hands covering mouth (for those rambunctious groups of learners)
- o What are the consequences of misbehavior?
 - Green Light Yellow Light Red Light
 - This works well for preschool and elementary
 learners. When they arrive, they put their name sticks in

a green jar. If they misbehave, they move their name stick to a yellow jar. If they continue to misbehave, they move their name stick to a red jar. If their name stick is moved to the red jar, they and their parents will be required to complete a Student Responsibility Plan to amend and improve their behavior for the future.

- o What are the <u>rewards for good behavior</u>? How will you show those who are well behaved that you appreciate them?
 - Stickers
 - Smiles
 - Send home a "Good Student Award" certificate so they can show their parents. (This doesn't have to be fancy or big. A half sheet of paper with clip art, appreciative words, and a place for the student's name is great.)

Pray together

- Gather your learners around your prayer table or sit in your prayer space.
- o Make the Sign of the Cross.
- Invite each person to say one thing for which they are <u>thankful</u>. After everyone has had a chance to share their thanksgiving, say something like, "Thank you, God, for all the blessings you have given to us. Amen."
- o You could <u>pass around an object</u> to help learners to focus. As each learner receives the ball, they say their prayer of thanksgiving (or petition or intercession). By using an object like this, if someone doesn't want to speak, they can hold the object and pray their prayer in their heart, then pass it on to the next person. (I used a small plastic ball one year and the students loved it. They called it their "Prayer Ball." Whenever we prayed, a designated student took the Prayer Ball off the prayer table, where it stayed as a reminder to all of us to pray always.)

o Younger learners need to know that we and God love them. One of the ways we can do this is to <u>bless them before they leave</u>. A simple Sign of the Cross on each learner's forehead with the words, "God bless you," can mean a lot. (I've done this with many classes and once the learners get used to it, before they leave they come up to me and stand in front of me until I bless them.)
