Archbishop Joseph Kurtz, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, has joined Pope Francis and the office for the Synod of Bishops in encouraging a universal Day of Prayer on September 28 for the Third Extraordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops addressing The Pastoral Challenges of the Family in the Context of Evangelization (October 5-19). Suggested prayers include a prayer to the Holy Family written by Pope Francis and intercessory prayers for the Prayers of the Faithful at Mass, other liturgical settings, and in family or personal prayer. World Meeting of Families



Next September, American Catholics will have a unique opportunity to participate in a global meeting of Catholics

focused on marriage and the family. It's called the **World Meeting of Families** and will take place in **Philadelphia, Sept. 22–27, 2015.** The theme for the World Meeting is *Love is Our Mission: The Family Fully Alive*. Although not officially announced yet, **Pope Francis** will preside over the closing Mass. Even if no one in your parish can travel to Philadelphia, there are a number of ways to make use of the many excellent resources accompanying the <u>World Meeting of Families</u>, including:

<u>Parish Resource Guide</u> – you will find many resources that will help your parish community prepare for the 8th World Meeting of Families, September 22-27, 2015. These resources will help everyone in your parish begin reflecting upon the beauty and joy of God's plan for marriage and family life in anticipation of the teachings, activities, and celebrations at the World Meeting of Families event. The Guide has special prayers, bulletin announcements, adult faith formation curriculum, and suggestions for using the Preparatory Catechesis (see next item).

<u>Preparatory Catechesis</u> – The official catechesis of the World Meeting of Families--Philadelphia 2015 is now available in both English and Spanish! The catechesis is available to buy through the WMF website or Our Sunday Visitor, the official publisher of the catechesis. There are also downloadable lesson plans for elementary and high school.




Building Intercultural Competence for Ministers: Oct. 20-24, 2014

At last week's general audience, Pope Francis said that Mother Church teaches us works of mercy are essential for our salvation, but it is not enough to do good to those who do good to us. We must also do good to those who are unable to reciprocate, as Jesus did. We see Jesus' words in the actions of the saints who have visited those in prison, of mothers who teach their children to share what they have with those in need, through women like Blessed Teresa of Calcutta who held the hand of the abandoned so they would not die alone.

"This is how the Mother Church teaches her children the works of mercy. She has learned this path from Jesus", the Pope said. "A good teacher does not get lost in the details, but points to what is essential so that the child or student can find meaning and joy in life."

Moving from his scripted speech, the Pope added this story: A mother told me that she wanted to teach this to her children and told them to help and give food to the hungry. One day at

lunch there was a knock on their door. A gentleman asked if they had something he could eat. The mother told her children, ages 4, 5, and 7 that a man was at the door asking for something to eat. "What should we do?" "Give him some, Mom, give him some!" they replied. Each child had a steak and fries on their plate. "Very well, each of you take half of your dinner and give it to him." "No, Mom, that's not fair!" "That's the way it is – you have to give him what you have." So this mother taught their children to give of their own food – not just when they have extra, but from whatever they have.

At this week's general audience, Pope Francis focused on the Creed's words *catholic* and *apostolic*. *Catholic* signifies that the Church is universal. "This means that the Church is found everywhere and teaches the whole truth regarding the heavens and the earth. The Church shows her catholicity by speaking all languages which is the effect of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit

gave to the Apostles and the whole Church the gift of proclaiming the Good News of God's

The Church

then is of her nature missionary, given to evangelization and encounter; that is, she is *apostolic*. Founded on the Apostles and in continuity with them, the Church is called to proclaim the Gospel to everyone, and to show the tenderness and power of God. This too flows from Pentecost. It is the Holy Spirit who prevents us from being self-absorbed, of thinking that the blessings of God are for us alone. Rather, the Spirit compels us to encounter our brothers and sisters, even those most distant from us in every way, to share with them the love, peace, and joy of the Risen Lord. May we always live in solidarity with all of humanity, and never closed in on ourselves. May we go out, in communion with the Successors of the Apostles, to announce Christ and his love to all.





Characteristics of Effective Catechists



The following is from What Do I Do Now? A Guide for the Reluctant Catechist. View sample pages and order from the <u>Pflaum Publishing Group</u>

There is a boatload of self-help books that give lists of characteristics shared by effective people, happy people, successful people, popular people—and the lists go on. "What might be a list of some of the characteristics of an effective catechist?" we asked. Below is our list. It certainly is not all-inclusive, but review the list. If you wish, choose one characteristic that can serve as a goal for your development throughout the year. Talk with other catechists, meet with your catechetical leader, read, observe, and practice.

Effective catechists—

- 1. Know and try to master the subject matter. While it is not necessary to have completed undergraduate studies in theology and education, it is necessary for catechists to grow in their understanding of the content that is being presented. For example, if you are teaching in a fifthgrade classroom that has devoted the entire year to sacraments, read a book or articles that will enrich your understanding of sacraments.
- **2. Know and respect the students.** What are your students' interests? What are their emotional, social, and cognitive abilities? What are the best methods for teaching and learning?
- **3.** Have positive expectations for success. Expect children to participate and learn. As a catechist, "get right down to business," while enthusiastically presenting the content in a caring and structured environment.

- **4. Prepare. Prepare. Prepare.** Create your own lesson plan for each session. Never wing it! Use the tools you are given and add what you can. It is a simple equation—the better prepared you are the more effective you will be.
- **5. Check for understanding, learning, and application.** Our goal is that by the end of each session the children will know, appreciate, and be able to practice the topic that was presented. Throughout the session ask children to tell you what they heard you say, one thing they will tell their parents, and what they will do in the coming week.
- **6. Provide an active and well-ordered learning environment.** Children need and welcome structure, routine, and consistent procedures. Write out your expectations clearly and positively, develop rewards and consequences for positive and negative behavior, and communicate expectations and instructions clearly.
- 7. **Keep it simple.** Don't get overwhelmed by the topics, information, and activities that are offered with each week's lesson. Be selective. Don't try to do everything. Choose only a few strategies to develop the main message of the lesson.

You may well come up with other items for the list. Just remember how your faith community is counting on you to strive to be an effective catechist.



At a meeting of the 43rd National Biblical Week, organised by the Italian Biblical Association, Pope Francis expressing his esteem and acknowledgement of the "valuable work" of the Association through the teachings of its lecturers and scholars. He continued, "Faith, to respond, and so as not to be suffocated, must be constantly nurtured by the Word of God. God has made the most of all the possibilities of human language, but at the same time He has had to submit His

Word to the limitations of this language. True respect for the inspired Scriptures requires us to make all the efforts necessary to fully grasp their meaning." Since it is not possible for every Christian personally to carry out the research necessary to arrive at a good understanding of Biblical texts, he added, "this task is entrusted to exegetes. ... Alongside academic competence, the Catholic exegete needs above all, faith: received from and shared with all believers."

"First and foremost, exegesis must help Christian people to perceive more clearly the Word of God in these texts, so as to accept it better, to live fully in communion with God." Returning to the words of St. John Paul II, Pope Francis remarked, "To arrive at a fully valid interpretation of the words inspired by the Holy Spirit... we must ask for love, as love alone makes us able to understand the language of God, which is love".
