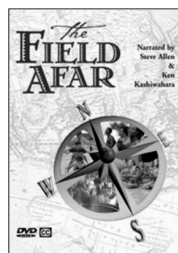

# Labor Day Statement

"And yet, Yahweh, you are our Father; we the clay and your our potter, all of us are the work of your hands" — *Isaiah 64:7*

Each year a Labor Day statement is issued by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' chairman of its Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development. This 2010 statement's title is "**A New 'Social Contract' for Today's 'New Things.'**" The statement is five pages long, and a link to it and to other resources from the USCCB can be found at our website: [www.seattlarch.org/missions](http://www.seattlarch.org/missions).

*An excerpt from the statement:*

"As a Church with a long tradition of bringing the light of the Gospel to the concrete social, economic, political, and cultural questions of the day, Pope Benedict reminds us this Labor Day that we as a nation and people do not live in isolation, we influence and are influenced by our brothers and sisters in all the nations, economies, and cultures that make up this globalized world. More than ever, the dignity of the worker is a foundation upon which we should measure much of what is good, and not so good, in the financial, industrial, and service sectors of our economy and our world."

*The above quote, and perhaps the one below, could be used in a parish or school bulletin around Labor Day weekend.*

"God gave humanity intelligence, sensitivity and the power of thought – tools with which to finish and perfect the work God began. Every worker is to some extent a creator – whether artist, craftsman, executive, laborer or farmer. ....when work is done in common – when hope, hardship, ambition and joy are shared – it brings together and firmly unites the wills, minds and hearts of people." — *Populorum Progressio* (Pope Paul VI, 1967)



**HCA** The Holy Childhood Association (HCA) offers young Catholics (grades K-8) an opportunity to grow in faith through mission education, sacrifice and service for others. A Pontifical Mission Society, HCA focuses entirely on "children helping children" throughout the world.

The 2010-2011 school-year theme is, "Lord, I put my faith in You" (John 9:38). This year, the HCA membership newsletters will be regional in focus. As such, HCA membership materials for fall will feature Oceania and the Americas; Advent materials will focus on Asia, and Lent materials will emphasize Africa.

Looking ahead: October is Mission Month. The HCA website offers reproducibles and other resources to help schools and religious education programs celebrate. October 1 is the Feast Day of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, co-patron, with St. Francis Xavier, of the Church's worldwide missionary work.

A statement by the Sudan Catholic Bishops' Conference was written in July in anticipation of January 9, 2011, when the people of southern Sudan are due to vote in a referendum on whether they should secede from the northern region of Sudan. [from the conclusion of the statement]

We commit ourselves and our Church to the work of peace-building and reconciliation on a daily and practical basis, in collaboration with others and in line with Catholic Social Teaching. We pledge ourselves to journey together with our people towards a just and lasting peace.

*I call heaven and earth today to witness against you; I have set before you life and death, the blessing and the curse. Choose life, then, that you and your descendants may live...* (Deuteronomy 30:19)

We have come a long way to reach this point. Our journey has not been easy and we have met with great difficulties. But we have faced these challenges as best we could with the help of God. Our hope is not dimmed, and we look to the future with confidence in God's loving care for us all.

We therefore encourage all those who are entitled to vote in the referenda in Southern Sudan and in Abyei to choose what kind of future they, their children and generations to come will enjoy. We encourage them to choose what kind of life they and their offspring will have, a life of freedom with justice and equal rights for all. As the Shepherds of the Church in Sudan we place our hope in God and look forward to a just and peaceful society where each person's rights and dignity are upheld.

We encourage them to choose life.

*For I know well the plans I have in mind for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare, not for woe! plans to give you a future full of hope.* (Jeremiah 29:11)



## Prayer for Pakistan

We pray for those who have been affected by the immense flooding in Pakistan. From the northern mountains to the southern wheat fields the rising water has left devastation in its wake. **Compassionate God, have mercy.**

## Quiz Answers

## 2010 Grants

The following CCHD grants were recommended to and approved by Archbishop Brunett. Funds for the grant program come from the Build Hope collection held in every parish in September (Sept. 11/12th this year). Local applications are available in March/April each year, and national ones throughout the year. ### Local Grants (average of \$2,500 each)

**Friends of the Carpenter:** Vancouver. Woodworking is used as a way of creating a safe and supervised space for homeless persons to form friendships and help others who are homeless to network to find support and resources to change their life situation. Project involves learning promotion and publicity skills.

**Homestead Community Land Trust:** Seattle. Addresses the need for housing equity in the Seattle-King County region by helping low- and moderate-income families buy affordable homes, by ensuring that these homes remain permanently affordable, and by working to eliminate the policy barriers that stand in the way of true housing equity.

**Women's Justice Circles:** (Sponsored by Intercommunity Peace and Justice Center). Various western Washington sites. To build relationships among low-income women in Washington state who want change, to claim personal and collaborative power, to understand the issues that make life difficult for low-income women, and to learn the skills of grassroots organizing and leadership.

**Latinos for Community Transformation:** South King County. The group develops new leaders from immigrant, low-income families so they can take action for social change in their communities. Through training, skills development and action participants gain tools and knowledge for advocacy.

**Lopez Community Land Trust:** Lopez Island. Local grant is for projects complementing the national grant.

**Women's Housing, Equality and Enhancement League (WHEEL):** Seattle/King county. Projects on homelessness among women in Seattle/King county, including planning for micro-enterprise and for advocacy for increased shelter and housing.

### National Grants (totaling \$85,000)

**Lopez Community Land Trust:** Lopez Island. Building a diverse, sustainable island community, specifically through affordable housing programs that primarily support low-income households.

**OPAL Community Land Trust:** Acquires and owns land so that residents of Orcas Island who are in need may have access to permanently affordable homes and workplaces. OPAL collaborates with others, develops improvements and stewards the land in a manner that is cooperative, stable, environmentally sensitive and socially responsible.

**Tenants Union:** Seattle/King County. Creates housing justice through grassroots education, organizing and advocacy. Organizing victories are achieved through outreach, training, leadership development, strategic analysis, creative direct action and legislative advocacy.

*Pope Benedict XVI reminds us, our "fraternal communion" in the Eucharist leads to "a determination to transform unjust structures and to restore respect for the dignity of all men and women, created in God's image and likeness" (Sacrament of Charity #89).*



**The Multi-Media Youth Arts Contest** is an annual contest organized by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD). It is designed as a tool for schools and parishes to engage Catholics in grades 7 through 12 in learning about the causes of poverty, Catholic social teaching, and CCHD.

The **2011** contest theme is: "Our Faith, Our Mission, Our Future: Building Community, Overcoming Poverty, Defending Human Dignity."
