Essential Religious Education Concepts

Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist [966-977, 1212-1419]

The Essential Concepts come from the Table of Contents for the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC). They have been re-organized to fit under the Six Tasks of Catechesis. CCC articles numbers associated with each Essential Concept are listed throughout this document. Referencing CCC article numbers is a recommended resource for catechist preparation.

TASK 2 - Liturgical Education- Students recognize the presence of Christ and enter into communication with Him through active, full, and conscious participation in the Liturgical celebrations and Sacraments of the Church

When people are baptized in the name of Jesus Christ, they become Christians, right? So, why do Catholics have confirmations? Bishop Don Hying shares some great information on this special sacrament. Based upon the Catechism of the Catholic Church (1285).

The Sacrament of Holy Eucharist (USCCB)

The third and final sacrament of initiation goes by many names. Most commonly, we speak of the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist - sometimes we say Holy Communion or the Mass. The sacrament really encompasses many things.







Resources from the LMC on The Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Reconciliation

Everything is Sacred: An Introduction to the Sacrament of Baptism (Scirghi, Thomas) Father Scirghi's book could easily become a standard introduction to the sacrament, and is the perfect guidebook for curious parents, enthusiastic newcomers, and confused cradle Catholics. You will understand why we invite parents to have their children baptized, and also why we baptize adults at the Easter Vigil Mass. You'll know the significance of the oil (and the candle) in the rite. And the next time you see a priest or deacon pour water over a child's head and pronounce the ancient baptismal formula, you'll have a richer appreciation for his words and his actions.

Take the Plunge: Living Baptism and Confirmation (Radcliffe, Timothy) Fr Radcliffe argues that Christianity will only thrive today, overcoming the challenges of secularism and religious fundamentalism, if we rediscover the beauty of baptism. It touches the deepest dramas of human life: birth, growing up, falling in love, daring to give oneself to others, searching for meaning, coping with suffering and failure, and eventually death.

Come to the Water: The Adult Journey to Baptism (DVD) Catholic Communication Campaign/USCCB. A group of adults come together to seek baptism into the Catholic Church at St. James Cathedral in Seattle, Washington. This DVD follows both catechumens and candidates in the year-round RCIA process of adult education and initiation into the Catholic community, culminating with their baptism at the Easter Vigil.

Youcat Confirmation Program (Ignatius Press) Written for the candidates in junior high and high school (or older), the book provides in-depth preparation for receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation. Designed in the same popular format as the YOUCAT, this book has interesting, lively text on m spiritual topics and themes to help the student be well prepared to receive the Sacrament.

Spirit and Truth: A Self-Guided Scripture Study for Confirmation and Beyond (Carotta, Mike) Vividly illustrates how life in the Spirit is at the heart of what the Church celebrates in confirmation. Allows candidates to work through a structured self- study on their own time, engaging in spiritual formation, study over 80 Old and New Testament passages as well as what the Church teaches about the Spirit, and reflect on their personal experience with the Spirit through open-ended questions based on Scripture passages.

Eucharist; A Journey of Transformation, Healing, and Discipleship (Amore, Mary) Weaving together Scripture, heartwarming stories, and easy-to-understand presentations of Catholic teaching, The book will set you on fire with love for Jesus in the Eucharist. In this three-part series, Amore invites us to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist in three ways: to be spiritually transformed, renewed in your discipleship, and spiritually healed.

Kids & The Sacraments-Baptism, Reconciliation, Communion, Confirmation (DVD, Paraclete Press) Introduce your kids, your classroom to four of the sacraments with this lively new video presentation. Each segment includes explanations from Father Ken, interviews with kids, on-screen storyboard Bible teaching, images from around the world, and "on the road" field trips to explore in depth where certain things come from, like Baptism's water, the altar bread of Communion, and Confirmation's oil.

The Beatitudes

The solemn blessings which mark the opening of the Sermon on the Mount, the very first of Our Lord's sermons in the Gospel of St. Matthew (5:3-10).

Living the Beatitudes: A Journey to Life in Christ (Brian J.

Bransfield) This book breaks open the richness of the Beatitudes and gently guides us into the journey of growing into the person God called us to be. He explains the admirable qualities that we see in Jesus and desire for ourselves: gentleness, fidelity, purity of heart, mercy, poverty of spirit, justice, peace, and perseverance in time of persecution.

Salt and Light: The Commandments, the Beatitudes, and a Joyful Life (Mark Shea) Offers a fresh perspective on the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes, showing how these two pillars of Christian moral teaching complement each other. The Ten Commandments are the "ground floor," providing the bare minimum contours of the moral life. The Beatitudes, by contrast, point us to a way we can live our lives as creatures intended to share in the life of God. Mark Shea, in his engaging style, introduces the modern reader to a fuller grasp of Catholic moral teaching as part of the process of being transformed by the Holy Spirit and living joyfully in virtue, not merely as a rule keeper. Salt and Light reveals the commandments as showing us our brokenness and pushing us toward the Savior--and then points the reader to the way to ultimate happiness: our beatitude.

A Man of the Beatitudes: Pier Giorgio Frassati (Frassati, Luciana) Chronicles the life of Pier Giorgio Frassati, focusing on his devotion to the Christian faith and his efforts to help others.

The Beatitudes for Children (Rosemarie Gortler) Contains eight illustrated lessons of Jesus that follow the Beatitudes, with simplified explanations and real-life applications to help encourage children to follow the Lord's instructions.

Close Encounters with the Beatitudes (DVD) Jimmy is puzzled as to what the Beatitudes mean to someone his age. When he dozes off, he receives a visit from an angel who shows him how some of his school mates are already helping to build God's kingdom. By the time Jimmy's journey with the angel is finished, he comes to an understanding and makes a commitment to live the Beatitudes in his own life.


Prayers By Heart: The Catholic Children's Prayer Book
