Resources from the LMC on The Sacraments of Healing: Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick

Freedom and Forgiveness: A Fresh Look at the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Fr. Paul Farren) The sacrament of Confession is probably the most talked about sacraments in the Catholic Church, as well as a spiritual practice being revived in many Protestant churches. This book explores the sacrament focusing on the two people who confess - God and the penitent. God is the primary confessor when he confesses his forgiveness for and trust in the one who is celebrating the sacrament.

Facing Forgiveness: A Catholic's Guide to Letting Go of Anger and Welcoming Reconciliation (Loughlan Sofield) Encourages Catholics to take the first steps in the process of forgiving. Over twenty-five stories of real people who found a way to forgive-or sometimes could not-portray the anger, the pain, and the struggles every human being confronts when faced with the challenge of offering forgiveness. Includes exercises for journaling and reflecting on each person's beliefs about forgiveness. An examination of conscience on forgiveness and a guide to celebrating the sacrament of penance, with the actual ritual and prayers, are included.

Jesuits on Reconciliation (DVD, Loyola Productions) The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a mystery to many, Catholic and non-Catholic alike. What is the real purpose of this sacrament? Why must a priest be involved? Doesn't God already know my shortcomings? How can Jesus really forgive me? Fr. Paul Brian Campbell, S.J., tackles these issues and illuminates this sacrament through its evolution in the church.

Anointing of the Sick (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops) This booklet is clearly and concisely presents the Church's teaching on perhaps its most misunderstood sacrament: the Anointing of the Sick. Through a series of seven question-and-answer sections, the reader comes to a greater knowledge of and appreciation for this beautiful aspect of the faith. Perfect for families and those concerned about the Anointing of the Sick, this booklet will reassure you and bring you and those you love to a deeper understanding of this beautiful Sacrament.

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick: Past and Present (DVD, Kathleen O. Chesto) Dr. Kathleen Chesto leads the viewer through the development and history of the sacrament of anointing starting with Old Testament times to post-Vatican II. Guide material and the presentation itself offer adults a better understanding of the importance of the sacraments in today's church and world.

Today Someone I Love Passed Away (Dianne Ahern) The great mystery of death and what happens when we die is perplexing for adults, but it is even more bewildering for children. This book provides a Catholic understanding of death and salvation, the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, and the Last Viaticum.

National Vocation Awareness Week, November 1-7, 2015

Heroic Living: Discover Your Purpose and Change the World (Chris Lowney) By merging Ignatian Spirituality with astute business knowledge, Lowney provides the tools and strategies needed to make practical, long-term life changes that move us away from our fractured, compartmentalized lives and toward the satisfaction and wholeness that each of us desires so deeply.

Forming Intentional Disciples: Path to Know and Follow Jesus (Sherry Weddell) A book designed to help Church leaders, parish staff and all Catholics transform parish life from within. Drawing upon her fifteen years of experience with the Catherine of Siena Institute, Sherry Weddell leads readers through steps that will help Catholics enter more deeply into a relationship with God and the river of apostolic creativity, charisms, and vocation that flow from that relationship for the sake of the Church and the world. Learn about the five thresholds of postmodern conversion, how to open a conversation about faith and belief, how to ask thought-provoking questions and establish an atmosphere of trust, when to tell the Great Story of Jesus, how to help someone respond to God's call to intentional discipleship, and much more.

Vocation Series: An Inside Look (St. Mary's Press) Who am I? How am I called to live in God's world? Those are fundamental questions every Catholic teen must face. Through the voices of other Christians who have walked the journey of faith, this series helps young people reflect prayerfully upon God's calling for them. The series includes a leader's guide and five books that give inside looks from the perspective of a married couple, a priest, a sister, a brother, and a single person.

The Calling (DVD, Pleasant Avenue Pictures) This absorbing documentary focuses on the struggles involved in responding to a religious vocation as it follows a young male novice and a mother superior, both of whom belong to a small community called the Family of Jesus the Healer. When the group's founder relocates them from Tampa, Fla., to Peru to serve that country's poor, both the newcomer and the veteran find it increasingly difficult to balance their calling with family ties and obligations back home. A moving study of sacred aspirations and of the courageous commitment required to fulfill them is all the more effective for not glossing over the emotional cost a generous answer to God's summons can sometimes exact. While the ultimate decisions made by the people chronicled vary, this remains both an uplifting story for a general audience and an excellent tool for realistic vocations work. A brief discussion regarding chastity.

Patrons and Protectors: More Occupations (Michael O'Neill McGrath) Images of saints as patrons of occupations remind us that we are called to build God's reign through our labor, an essential part of Christian life. Among the saints depicted in this volume are Martha, who served meals to Jesus in her home; Francis of Assisi, often

associated with nurturing animals; and Katharine Drexel, who was recently canonized. Alongside McGrath's commentary about why a saint is associated with a particular occupation are essays by men and women engaged in that work. As we see the variety of ways human beings contribute their talents and skills, we become inspired to view our jobs with fresh eyes.

Jubilee Year of Mercy

Pope Francis has called the special <u>Jubilee Year for Mercy</u> to begin Dec. 8, the feast of the Immaculate Conception and the 50th anniversary of the closing of the Second Vatican Council. It will close on Nov. 20, 2016, the day celebrated that year as the feast of Christ the King.
