Dear Catechetical Colleagues,

Happy New Year! We hope that all of you are at the beginning of a grace-filled 2016! We are looking forward to several events planned over the next few months, these include a Faith Formation Presentation and Luncheon on March 15th, the PAFF Workshop and Retreat on April 28-29th, and our Annual PAFF Conference on June 1st. More information about these events will be shared in upcoming newsletters, but please mark your calendars now!

Our "Essential Concept" this week is **Made in the Image of God - Foundation of Human Dignity**. As you are aware, this concept is foundational to our understanding of Catholic morality. It also offers us a great opportunity to focus on the importance of protecting all of God's children.

With the transition to VIRTUS in the Safe Environment Office, we will be required and audited on a new curriculum that we will be implementing in all Faith Formation programs. Effective September 2016, every parish and school Faith Formation program will be required to teach the Touching Safety program created by VIRTUS. We have worked with the Safe Environment Office to incorporate this curriculum into our Archdiocesan Religious Education Standards.

The job of ensuring children's safety is a challenging undertaking. The prevention of child sexual abuse requires more than adult awareness, education, and training about the nature and scope of the problem. As you are aware, it is important we provide our children with the resources they need to overcome the advances of someone who intends to do them harm. The Touching Safety program is a tool designed to assist parents and teachers in this important task. Each year, the program provides a theme that introduces and builds on the basic concepts of the Touching Safety program. The material is developmentally appropriate for each age group and includes content and activities that reinforce the message. Our offices will be in contact with you in the coming months in regards to how catechists will be implementing this. We will also be offering additional information on implementation methods during our PAFF Workshop to be held at the Archbishop Brunett Retreat Center on April 28-29, 2016.

The Essential Concepts come from the Table of Contents for the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC). They have been re-organized to fit under the Six Tasks of Catechesis. CCC articles numbers associated with each Essential Concept are listed throughout this document. Referencing CCC article numbers is a recommended resource for catechist preparation.

TASK 3 - Moral Formation- Students develop a moral conscience that is informed by Church teachings and conformed to Christ, as modeled in a personal life of virtue, and demonstrated in service of the Gospel's demands for society.

Life in a Flash: Teaching Respect for Life One Card at a Time (Flash Cards) Healing the Culture. Do the ends justify the means? Can a terminally ill person with only weeks to live have a high quality of life? Can science prove the fetus is a person? How can we tell the difference between truth and opinion? Are some human beings worth less than



others? Does human value depend on how developed we are? Where do human rights come from? Is physician-assisted suicide just a personal choice? Is abortion justifiable if a child will be born with a disability? Can a fetus be a baby if you want it to be, and not a baby if you don't? An engaging way to learn essential principles that uphold human dignity, contribute to personal growth, and build a culture of life. Flash cards on happiness, ethics, logic, and justice. Christian Moral Life: A Primary Source Reader (Ann Nunes) Christian morality is synonymous with life in Christ. We are to love God with our whole being and to love others as Jesus loves us, because God created all of us in his image and wants us to love one another as he loves us. The Christian moral life is defined by being in loving relationships and by living our lives in response to the teachings of Jesus. The collection of readings in Christian Moral Life A Primary Source Reader aims to help you learn the moral concepts and teachings that guide us to live our lives as disciples of Christ.



Practice Makes Catholic: Moving from a Learned Faith to a Lived Faith (JoePaprocki) Addresses the all-important "why" of many Catholic practices by articulating five key characteristics that form our Catholic identity: a sense of sacramentality, a commitment to community, a respect for the dignity of human life and commitment to justice, a reverence for Tradition, and a disposition to faith and hope rather than despair. Under each of these categories, he explores and explains multiple Catholic practices, then describes how following each one can make a profound difference in our faith and in our lives.

<u>Poverty Awareness Month</u> - During January, join the U.S. Bishops, the Catholic Campaign for Human Development and the Catholic Community in the United States in taking up Pope Francis' challenge to live in <u>solidarity with the poor!</u>

St. Francis and Pope Francis: Prayer, Poverty, and Joy in Jesus (Alan Schreck) Alan Schreck considers the times and messages of both St. Francis of Assisi and Pope Francis, and invites you to experience the same freedom and joy that they have found in Jesus. St. Francis and Pope Francis brings together themes that are central to the mission of both of these men:

Conversion - their stories are different but their message the same: turn to God, Prayer - union with Jesus is for everyone, Poverty - the imitation of Christ heals and restores, Church - faithfulness is the foundation for renewal, Mission - the same in every age: share the Gospel, Joy - the hallmark of Catholic life, and possible for us today. Two men separated by 800 years. One vision.

A Place at the Table (DVD-Home Entertainment) 50 million people in the U.S. - one in four children - don't know where their next meal is coming from, despite our having the means to provide nutritious, affordable food for all Americans. Directors Kristi Jacobson and Lori Silverbush examine this issue through the lens of three people who are struggling with food insecurity: Barbie, a single Philadelphia mother who grew up in poverty and is trying to provide a better life for her two kids; Rosie, a Colorado fifth-grader who often has to depend on friends and neighbors to feed her and has trouble concentrating in school; and Tremonica, a Mississippi second-grader whose asthma and health issues are exacerbated by the largely empty calories her hardworking mother can afford.

Maddi's Fridge (Lois Brandt) With humor and warmth, this children's picture book raises awareness about poverty and hunger. Best friends Sofia and Maddi live in the same neighborhood, go to the same school, and play in the same park, but while Sofia's fridge at home is full of nutritious food, the fridge at Maddi's house is empty. Sofia learns that Maddi's family doesn't have enough money to fill their fridge and promises Maddi she'll keep this discovery a secret. Filled with colorful artwork, this storybook addresses issues of poverty with honesty and sensitivity while instilling important lessons in friendship, empathy, trust, and helping others. A call to action section, with six effective ways for children to help fight hunger and information on anti-hunger groups, is also included.

One Hen: How One Small Loan Made a Big Difference (Katie Smith Milway) Based on a true story, tells of how a poor Ghanaian boy buys a chicken through a community loan program, which eventually helps lift him, his mother, and his community out of poverty.

Jubilee Year of Mercy

Pope Francis has called the special <u>Jubilee Year for Mercy</u> to begin Dec. 8, the feast of the Immaculate Conception and the 50th anniversary of the closing of the Second Vatican Council. It will close on Nov. 20, 2016, the day celebrated that year as the feast of Christ the King.
