Human Freedom and Conscience Formation [1030-1037, 1730-1802]

The Essential Concepts come from the Table of Contents for the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC). They have been re-organized to fit under the Six Tasks of Catechesis. CCC articles numbers associated with

each Essential Concept are listed throughout this document. Referencing CCC article numbers is a recommended resource for catechist preparation.

TASK 3 - Moral Formation- Students develop a moral conscience that is informed by Church teachings and conformed to Christ, as modeled in a personal life of virtue, and demonstrated in service of the Gospel's demands for society.

Resources from the LMC on Human Freedom and Conscience Formation

Conscience in Conflict: How to Make Moral Choices (Kenneth Overberg) Offers a readable and up-to-date process for coming to a decision about crucial contemporary

personal and social questions. The first part presents the fundamental building blocks of Catholic morality, the basic structures, goals and dynamics of Christian life. The second part turns to specific moral issues: sexual issues, medical issues, war and economics.

Principles & Choices (Healing the Culture). Principles and Choices is a state-of-the-art, comprehensive high school curriculum on the special dignity and unique value of human life. The program immerses students in the Four Levels of Happiness, and helps them master basic principles of logic, ethics, and justice.

Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship: A Call to Political Responsibility from the Catholic Bishops of the United States (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops) This 2015 limited revision of Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship gives pastoral guidance to help Catholics in the United States exercise their political responsibility well. This important teaching document integrates new policy developments in the United States as well as new papal teachings, including that of Pope Benedict XVI and Pope Francis to date. The limited revision presents to the Catholic faithful, and all those of good will, an up-to-date guide for forming their consciences as they participate in the civil order.

An Introduction to Making Moral Choices (Mark Miller) A brief but cogent summary in plain language of how people make moral decisions. Using examples from daily living, Miller discusses what morality is, what conscience is, the myriad influences on our decisions, how morality relates to civil law, to society's norms and customs, and to religious faith. Sympathetic to the "messiness of human living", Miller discusses the need for dialogue and consultation, for being in touch with the wisdom of the ages and those we respect, to arrive at a moral decision. He does not offer answers to abstract moral questions, but rather attempts to guide readers toward making good choices based on what is human and what is moral and right.

Freedom and Forgiveness: A Fresh Look at the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Paul Farren) This book explores the sacrament of Reconciliation focusing on the two people who confess - God and the penitent. God is the primary confessor when he confesses his forgiveness for and trust in the one who is celebrating the sacrament. The gift of freedom, the existence of hell, and the role of conscience are discussed at length.

The Ninth Day (DVD, Telepool) Quietly compelling drama about a Catholic priest temporarily released from a concentration camp and returned to his native Luxembourg, where a young SS officer informs him that he has nine days to convince the staunchly anti-Nazi bishop to sign a letter supporting Hitler, leading to a battle of wills in which the priest must choose between survival and the dictates of his conscience. Loosely based on the prison diaries of real-life Luxembourg priest Father Jean Bernard, and intelligently directed by Jesuit-educated German filmmaker Volker Schlondorff, the picture is an emotionally forceful and morally complex meditation on faith, redemption and the cost of true discipleship.

Threshold Bible Study for Lent (23rd Publications)

People of the Passion Suffering seems to bring out the best and worst in our human nature. Some people are overcome with hopelessness that leads to despair; others are filled with courage that leads to heroism. The people of the passion in this book are the characters who participated in some way in the suffering and death of Jesus: Peter, Pilate, Mary Magdalene, Simon of Cyrene, the daughters of Jerusalem, and the woman who anointed Jesus.

Pilgrimage: In the Footsteps of Jesus Because Jesus entered our world in the human condition, our faith has deep roots in the physical places where he was born, walked and talked, laughed and wept, suffered, died, and rose again. Though a bodily pilgrimage may not be possible for many, this imaginative pilgrimage unites these hallowed places with the sacred texts associated with the life of Jesus.

The Tragic & Triumphant Cross The cross is both the world's most contemptible instrument of punishment and the symbol of humanity's greatest hope. In turning this tool of torture into his followers' proudest boast, Jesus produced the most dramatic reversal the world has ever experienced.

The Resurrection and The Life What exactly did happen on Easter morning? Why did it impel the disciples to begin a journey which would transform the world? What does this mean to us, here where we live today? This book will help you understand what the Scriptures teach us about our own resurrection and how that hope gives purpose to everything we do.

Jesus, the Messianic King: Part One: Mattthew (1-16) Matthew's gospel presents Jesus as Israel's royal Messiah, inaugurating God's kingdom in the world. It was written to help Jewish Christians understand that their faith in Jesus was entirely consistent with the faith of ancient Israel. With frequent quotations and allusions from the Old Testament, Matthew demonstrates how Jesus is both Son of David and Son of God. This study will help you understand the scope of this gospel, the clear advice it offers for the church, and its personal implications for the lives of disciples today.

Jesus, the Messianic King: Part Two: Matthew (17-28) The second half of Matthew's Gospel moves from the Transfiguration to the Resurrection, announcing Jesus as the world's true King. The life, death, and resurrection of Jesus bring the hopes of ancient Israel to their dramatic climax, linking Jesus' royal character to his humble service and self-sacrificing love. This study completes the unique portrait of Jesus developed in the first half of Matthew's Gospel and offers firm guidance for the Church and disciples today.

Pope Francis has called the special <u>Jubilee Year for Mercy</u> to begin Dec. 8, the feast of the Immaculate Conception and the 50th anniversary of the closing of the Second Vatican Council. It will close on Nov. 20, 2016, the day celebrated that year as the feast of Christ the King.
